World Communion Sunday (originally called World Wide Communion Sunday) is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical church. The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in 1933, where Dr. Hugh Thompson Kerr served as pastor. It was their attempt to bring churches together in a service of Christian unity – in which everyone might receive both inspiration and information, and above all, to know how important the Church of Jesus Christ is, and how each congregation is interconnected one with another.

For the World Communion Sunday worship service, you are invited to dress in a way that is representative of your family's country or culture of origin.

Embracing Our Future With Faith– Welcome to This Year's Stewardship Campaign!

Autumn is upon us, and at Sixth Church that means our annual stewardship campaign will soon begin. Look for your pledge packet – letter, pledge card, and brochure – in late October.

This year's stewardship campaign finds us at a crossroads. The Pastoral Nominating Committee will soon begin interviewing candidates to serve as our permanent Pastor, and the Music Director Search Committee is also at work. At the same time, life at Sixth goes on much as it has in past years.

This combination of change and continuity is healthy! It shows that we are **"Embracing our Future with Faith,"** the theme that we have chosen for this year's stewardship campaign.

We have faith that through our thoughts and prayers, God will guide us to a bright future. We also believe that the remarkable strengths of our congregation – including the talents of our members and staff – will preserve, enhance, and grow all that we love about Sixth Church.

In keeping with this theme, the stewardship campaign looks faithfully to the future. To ensure that we can attract the candidate we choose as our future pastor, we are budgeting a competitive salary offer based on guidance from the Pittsburgh Presbytery. At the same time, we are also planning to offer our Christian Education Director, Custodian, and Office Administrator well-deserved salary increases. We also need to cover the increased cost of employee health benefits, as well as higher water and sewer rates.

Your pledges, which account for three-quarters of our annual income, are essential for us to realize this vision. We have set a pledge goal of \$357,000, which represents a 2% increase above the \$350,000 you pledged during last year's campaign. We are **therefore asking you to add 2% to the amount you pledged for 2024 and make that your pledge for 2025.** By doing so, you will faithfully – and optimistically – embrace a bright future for Sixth Church.



EARTH CARE NEWS: Is Giant Eagle Getting Rid of Plastic?



The short answer is "Not that much." There are two issues here: one is replacing the single-use plastic bags with brown paper bags for a while, but apparently there was pushback from customers and they now charge 10 cents for a sturdier, reusable, but still plastic bag.

The other issue is all the other plastic in use at Giant Eagle stores. Our friend Melissa McSwigan* has an eagle eye for plastic and contacted Giant Eagle in May. Below is her letter. When Melissa did not receive an adequate response from initially contacting customer service, she sent a letter to Giant Eagle management and hopes this will get them thinking about plastic in a more in-depth way.

Hi Giant Eagle,

Your stores are a community asset/necessity and you are involved in some good initiatives – but boy is there a lot of plastic in the bakery dept, produce, prepared foods, etc. !! Some is generated by Giant Eagle, while others comes from other suppliers. As you likely know, these plastic containers (for croissants, cookies, etc.) despite having a plastic recycling triangle/number are not recyclable in the City of Pittsburgh and this is true for a number of other municipalities.

The global recycling crisis has been in the news for a number of years where China no longer wants our plastic for a number of reasons and the City of Pittsburgh dramatically reduced what containers it will accept. (There is a rare exception where Michael Brothers Hauling has apparently has found some way to recycle some plastic that the City won't take, but it means people need to separate and take their plastic there and most will not do this). All those cookies, croissants, etc. could be in plastic bags or something better (boxes?). Plastic is contaminating everything in our world- from our oceans, lakes, parks and in our own bodies as it doesn't decompose (it will outlive all of us). The average person may consume 5 grams of plastic a week (about the amount in a credit card)! It's poisoning us, wildlife, and our soil and water.

Giant Eagle could be a leader and take meaningful steps to reduce your plastic footprint –especially with regard to your own products. Nothing will happen overnight – but a concerted effort /and moving toward the goal of reduction is something Giant Eagle really must do and can do.

*Melissa picks up Brita water filters from us for recycling. Michael Brothers doesn't take these filters, but Melissa collects them and sends them to TerraCycle.
